FROM OUR PASTOR

Good News is Worth Telling.

Let me practice a little of what I'm preaching to you on Sunday mornings. Let me share with you some items of praise and good news. Some of you may know these, some may not. But amidst all the construction and growing pains, I think Midway could use a large drink of cool water in the form of some good news. In no particular order, I praise the Lord for:

- A Sr. High youth group that has returned from another great RYM conference in FL. About 25 youth from Midway heard great preaching by campus ministers, bonded together, and praised the Lord. A little volleyball and sunning at the beach was enjoyed, too.
- Our deacons reported that our receipts are actually ahead of budget in what is normally a summer slump. Most churches finish strong in December and dip in the summer in attendance and giving. Furthermore, contributions to our Building Fund are ahead of schedule and approaching the \$5 M mark. Once we crest that goal, we will have approximately half of our total construction paid for prior to borrowing a penny! I am amazed.
- Your attitude on 3 consecutive rainy Sundays was as good as it could be. We apologize for the mud and mess, and in a short time, some of this will subside.
- Even with all the challenges around us, Midway's ministry is not put on the shelf but continues. We had a wonderful send-off for Rev. Greg Doty and have heard stirring missionary reports this summer.
- Midway School is preparing to start its 11th year, and please pray that some of the very large construction items may be in place by then.

Most importantly, our great news is that Jesus is Lord, He rules and reigns, we may always trust Him, and he ever lives above to make intercession for us. *Christ is praying from heaven, with all authority, for Midway.*

Yes, there's much good news that we could share. Will you join us in that? I pray that you'll drink some of God's goodness in the remaining weeks of summer. And grab that last break with your families. Fall should be an exciting time.

FROM THE CUTTING FLOOR

From Geoff Thomas (a fine Baptist pastor in Wales), came these notes on the spiritual armor God provides in Eph. 6.

On the "belt of truth," Thomas comments: "This is truth worked deep down into the inner parts of the Christian that produces integrity of life and faithfulness of service. In other words, we must have truth worked into our hearts, and that truth produces a sincerity of mind and heart – a wholeheartedness, an integrity – if we are going to be able to stand in the day of evil. In other words, the doctrine has to be worked right down to our bones so that it becomes a part of us and if affects everything that we are and we do, so that we are people of truth and integrity, and then we will be able to resist the devil in the evil day.

How important is the truth? Truth is vital in every area. The truth tells us that we have an eternal future; the truth protects us from the deadly lie that 'this life is all there is.' Truth tells us who God really is and what God is really like, saving us from idols and false gods. Truth tells us who we are as creatures made in God's image and as fallen sinners, protecting us from having too low an opinion of our value and too high an opinion of our virtue. Truth shows us ultimate reality in Jesus Christ, protecting us from putting anything else on the throne of our hearts. Isn't truth uppermost? Zeal without truth is fanaticism. Warmth without truth is a forest fire. The difference between truth and lies is the difference between God and Satan. Scripture speaks of the Lord as "the God of truth" (Isaiah 65:16) and of Satan as "the father of lies" (John 8:44). Satan uses error to attack us; God uses truth to protect us. The first thing we have to put on is the belt of truth.

Nothing equips a man to help other people like that gospel. Your own heart is at peace because you know that you are right with God. In William Gurnall's *The Christian in Complete Armour* he says, "It wouldn't help a condemned man on the road to execution if you put a fragrant rose in his hand and advised him to smell the flower and feel better about everything. He would still see the gallows just ahead. But if a messenger from the Prince should press a pardon into his hand he would be overcome with joy. That is the only thing that could change the man's heart. Anything short of pardoning mercy is as insignificant to a troubled conscience as that flower would be in a dying man's hands." We have from the King of kings the offer of pardon to dying rebel sinners.

There's a book by a man named James Graham, *The Divine Unfolding of God's Plan of Redemption*, where he defines the two major satanic tactics as **murder and mixture**. Indeed, he thinks that the entire Old Testament history can be read in terms of these two tactics. By *murder* Satan either tries to kill off the godly seed through whom God was working his purposes. The evil one attacked the infant Moses in Egypt, and the seed of the woman - the line of Christ; by him the three believers were thrown into a burning fiery furnace, and Daniel into a den of lions; he sought to kill the baby Jesus and stone to death the leaders of the early church). By *mixture* Satan weakened the people by many compromises with Baal, idolatry and alliances with Egypt, Assyria, and Babylon all tempting them to compromise in serving him.

Which was more successful? It depends in what culture you live. What kills wasps? A jar half full of vinegar and water, or a jar half full of honey and water? The honey attracts wasps and drowns them every time. So the history of Europe has shown that mixture triumphs over murder as the principal means of destroying the cause of Christ. So it was in Old Testament times and throughout the church age especially in the Western world. But it is different in Pakistan, Burma, northern Nigeria, the Sudan and throughout the Middle East where murder is still the way of Satan to destroy the church. Last month 50 year old Ghorban Tari the pastor of an house-church of converted Christians in a place called Gonbad-e-Kavu in northeast Iran was stabbed to death and his body thrown in front of his home where his wife and four children live. He is the fifth Protestant pastor murdered in Iran in the past 11 years

Finally, a snippet from C. S. Lewis on Satan's wiles. C. S. Lewis's classic *Screwtape Letters* features a Senior Demon teaching his nephew (Wormwood) the tactics of devils. In his backwards universe, he refers to Satan as

“our Father,” and the true God as “the Enemy.” These contraband letters show how Satan works to tempt or distract Christians. In one section from this classic, Screwtape coaches that if Wormwood cannot cause the new Christian to doubt God, at least get his eyes off God and onto the church and her imperfections. He urges that, by all means, don’t let the convert “attend one church, and one church only. . . Surely you know that if a man can’t be cured of churchgoing, the next best thing is to send him all over the neighborhood looking for the church that ‘suits’ him until he becomes a taster or connoisseur of churches.” Instead of bringing all different types of people together, Screwtape prefers the “congregational principle” which “makes each church into a kind of club . . . and finally a coterie or faction. In the second place, the search for a ‘suitable’ church makes the *man a critic where the Enemy [God] wants him to be a pupil.*” The devil thinks that if he can turn Christians into critics, instead of humble disciples who accept God’s word, he will win or distract. This will also force each church to compete to create some fad or worldly attraction to keep the critic’s attention.” See, how many ways spiritual warfare may work!!

Rain – real heaven sent showers of blessing. There is nothing like real rain. Why Choose Choir?

We are such blessed people! God's providence abounds, even in the ordinary things of life. In a world where many people wake each day, and wonder if there will be food for a single meal for their children, we wake and wonder how to spend God's plenteous blessings. As parents, we have many choices to make for our children. . . where to send them to school, curriculum choices for our homeschoolers, and the all-important extra-curricular activities! What'll it be? Sports, dance, music lessons, debate teams. . . the choices are too numerous to list. As you make your decisions about how your children should spend their time this coming school year, I encourage you to consider the Children's Choir program at Midway.

Paul S. Jones, in his book *Singing and Making Music*, quotes from one of the publications at Tenth Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia, saying, "From the Middle Ages the Church was the center of musical, religious and even general education. Churches had schools of singing called *scola cantorum* in which the music of the church was learned by young choirboys and men . . .

Singing is one of the few known eternal activities (Isa. 6; Rev. 4-5). We must reclaim the right and responsibility to teach young Christians 'to sing and to make music for the Lord.' Parents, it is incumbent upon you to help us in this regard. A child's musical aptitude is formed fully by the age of nine years, so it is important to reach children early in life. The benefits of music in learning development, memory, abstract thought, math and so forth are well documented, but aside from such benefits, the primary advantage is musical literacy." (151)

Here at Midway, we offer a children's choir program for ages K-5 through high school. Our *Cherub Choir* (K5-2nd grade) is under the most capable direction of Abby Eller. *Midway Singers* includes grades 3 and up. This year we will be venturing into new territory with the inclusion of music designed specifically for the cambiata voice. Both choirs will receive training in vocal production and music literacy as we prepare hymns and anthems for our worship services. Parents, your children are tomorrow's leaders in music ministry. I invite you to consider including Midway Children's Choirs as you plan your fall schedule. Just think, an extra-curricular activity that has benefits into eternity!!

Now is also the perfect time for adults to join one of our adult choirs. We are always delighted to have new singers join our ranks, just in time to learn some

great anthems for Reformation Sunday, Thanksgiving and Christmas! Please consider using your God-given ability to sing with a Midway Choir. And if you can't sing (or think you can't sing), maybe you would like to ring! Our handbell choir will have a couple of openings this fall, and is looking for a permanent director. We will also offer a beginning handbell choir.

Registration for children's and handbell choirs will take place every Sunday this August in the choir room immediately following worship services. Adult choir requires no registration, just come to a rehearsal, and you're in! I hope to see all of you in rehearsals this fall. Call if you have any questions.
